It was originally constructed in August 1942 to house Russian and other forced labourers. Between March 1943 and June 1944 it was used by SS Construction Brigade 1 as a concentration camp. Lager Sylt was the western-most SS concentration camp, and the only one constructed on British soil. The camp was the centre for some of the worst abuses and deaths of workers and prisoners during the occupation, including executions, and so is one of the most important sites of war time significance on the Island. The camp gate pillars, two concrete shelters, the underground kitchen storeroom, three concrete sentry boxes and the patio of the Camp Commandant's chalet - with its tunnel to the camp and coal store - still remain. A plaque was attached to one of the gates in 2008, with a ceremony attended by two of survivors of the camp.

Given the historical importance of the site (in relation to both the role of forced labour and the wider occupation of the Island), it is considered that protection of the site is justified. Pending registration on the Register of Historic Buildings and Ancient Monuments, interim policy protection will be afforded to this site through the Land Use Plan.
