Assisted Dying – Framework for Debate

I set out some of the issues that I think we may need to consider if we are to move forward.

The first question of course is: do we support the basic concept of 'Assisted Dying' and if so why?

If we do support the concept then I think we need to be able to agree some basic principles, for example, would the following be appropriate:

- when death is inevitable suffering should not be along with good care, dying people deserve the right to control the timing and manner of their death;
- assisted dying should be controlled by the dying person only there should be no right to allow anyone else to end another's life
- dying people should have the means to control their death safely and comfortably in their own home
- those healthcare professional who may not wish to assist dying people to control their own death should not be required to do so.

What other fundamental principles we should be incorporating and if so what are they?

What safeguards should be in place, for example, should:

- assistance be limited to terminally ill and mentally competent adults?
- there be a requirement for the dying person to end their own life and not to permit other persons to do it for them?
- there be a waiting period to give the dying person time to reflect on their decision
- there be a requirement for an assessment by doctors and/or lawyers
- the dying person be allowed to choose to die at home.

Any other safeguards?

Are there any other conditions that we might want to apply, for example

- should the right be limited to Alderney and/or Bailiwick residents
- would we want this to apply in Alderney even if other British jurisdictions rejected it
